## Why Capcom's CEO Will Retire In America



What, retire? Never going to happen for Kenzo Tsujimoto. It's not in his DNA. From a young age, when his dad died, he worked to support his family.

"It's just what I know," exclaims Tsujimoto, Chairman and CEO of Capcom, a video game

maker and publisher, which raked in more than \$1.2 billion in sales in Fiscal Year 2011 with games like "Resident Evil" and "Street Fighter."

The 69 year-old video game mogul is now setting himself up for retirement. Although, for him, retirement means, simply, a different job.

"But that's **not for a long ways out**," says Tsujimoto, who doesn't plan to leave Capcom or the video game industry anytime soon. "I'm just setting up a future in wine, and you have to start early."



He started Kenzo Estate Winery in Napa Valley 15 years ago, and hopes it'll be profitable by the time he turns his part-time passion into his full-time profession.
